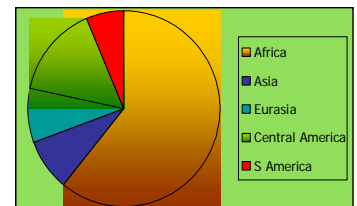
People around the world utilize resources to improve their lives!

FRB continues to see confirmation that investments in the future of villages and farmers in the developing world are showing positive returns. Since FRB's inception it has supported 100 overseas programs all over the world, 57 of which are currently active. More than 100,000 families have improved their own lives by working with the resources provided through FRB and its network of members and partners.

A recent visit to Armenia was a chance for some FRB growing project participants from the US to see the life-changing work that is taking place. LeRoy & Marilyn Brocka and George & Norma Armstrong traveled with FRB and visited with people involved in the Armenia PASS program which helps people develop agriculture in various institutional settings. One of the people that touched the visitors' hearts was a young man named Abraham, a 17-year-old orphan who arrived at the boarding school 2 years ago. He was uncertain about his life and what direction it would take. Through the agriculture classes and hands-on work he has found a meaning and hope for the future. Abraham, pictured above with LeRoy Brocka, shared that his goal is to become a farmer!

Abraham's story is one of thousands and thousands from the many programs supported through FRB. Here are some examples of those programs that have progressed beyond basic self-sufficiency, expanded into new geographies, involved new people that have not previously been involved, and built community capacity:

- In March 2010, there will be a celebration in Kenya as the people from the Bamba program share their experiences and learning as they help the people of Ganze begin their own program.
- The people of Kenya Machokos continue expanding their program which consists of water harvesting, raising crops and animals, forming cooperatives, marketing and constructing local roads. To date, the program has included more than 20,000 individuals and just keeps growing!
- Zambian Eastern has completed a phase which focused on working with 8,000 individuals of which more than 80% have adopted sustainable practices. The program leadership now will focus on a new area including a new group of 8,000 people.
- In the Gambia in western Africa, the Gamhort program has surpassed expectations — producing 138% of expected yield for vegetables being sold to restaurants and hotels. The next phase will address the needs of urban families and those living with HIV by utilizing hydroponic gardening in smaller areas.
- The gift continues to multiply in Mozambique as cattle survival has improved and primary beneficiaries pass along the first born calves to secondary beneficiaries again this year.
- As communities in the Nicaragua Mateare program become more self-sufficient, program staff in the area are able to spend time with new people involved in the program in a place called Carazo.



FRB has supported 57 programs in 33 countries benefitting more than 100,000 farm families overseas since 1999.

- The model for the Nicaragua Farmer land bank concept has inspired a new program in Conquista.
- Guatemala Totonicapan is expanding into northwestern Guatemala.
- Cambodia South is adding crop diversity as well as management of water and water resources to their previous successes in building capacity of small grassroots organizations and rice intensification.
- The Dominican Republic Bateyes program will expand into 32 additional communities upon the recent completion of work with 24 communities that brought access to land, input and agricultural techniques.
- In Armenia, an agricultural cooperative from the Netherlands will soon be visiting to learn about the program model. The Armenian Ministry of Education has expressed their appreciation to FRB's local partner for the work being done.
- People in the Balkans continue to share their produce with soup kitchens years after their program has been completed.
- The Bolivia Tacobamba program has worked with municipal governments to establish risk management committees and establish the position of Secretary for Risk Management and Disaster Prevention. This focus came about in response to the area's vulnerability to natural disasters resulting in loss of crops, livestock and natural resources. The program has also worked with the municipality to raise awareness of gender equity in municipal budgeting. The result has been that women's organizations participate in monthly meetings with local community authorities, and their plans are included in the annual operating plan of the municipality.

FRB's approach to world hunger was affirmed recently (October 15, 2009), when philanthropist Bill Gates, addressing the World Food Prize conference in Des Moines on October 15, said, "How do you help people who live on less than a dollar a day? They face huge difficulties. How can they get some traction, so that their daily struggle can lead to a better life?"

The answer is in the work they do. Three-quarters of the world's poorest people get their food and income by farming small plots of land. So if we can make small-holder farming more productive and more profitable, we can have a massive impact on hunger and nutrition and poverty. Melinda and I believe that helping the poorest small-holder farmers grow more crops and get them to market is the world's single most powerful lever for reducing hunger and poverty."
